

## SPEAKER BIOGRAPHIES

**DR OTHON ANASTASAKIS** is the Director of South East European Studies at Oxford (SEESOX); Senior Research Fellow at St Antony's College; former Director of the European Studies Centre, St Antony's College, Oxford; associate at the Department of Politics and International Relations. He teaches "South East European politics and European integration" and "EU politics" in Oxford. He is the Principal Investigator of the Greek Diaspora Project at SEESOX. He is also an Adjunct Professor at Simon Fraser University in Vancouver, Canada. He is the Region Head of Europe in Oxford Analytica. He received his BA in Economics from the University of Athens, his MA in Comparative Politics and International Relations from Columbia University, New York and his PhD in Comparative Government from the London School of Economics. His most recent books include *Balkan Legacies Of The Great War: The Past Is Never Dead* (with David Madden and Elizabeth Roberts, Palgrave Macmillan, 2016); *Defining A New Reform Agenda; Paths To Sustainable Convergence In South East Europe* (with Peter Sanfey and Max Watson, SEESOX 2013); *Reforming Greece: Sisyphean Task Or Herculean Challenge?* (with Dorian Singh, SEESOX 2012); *In The Shadow Of Europe: Greeks And Turks In The Era Of Post-nationalism* (with Kalypso Nicolaidis and Kerem Oktem, Brill, 2009); *Greece In The Balkans: Memory, Conflict And Exchange* (with Dimitar Bechev and Nicholas Vrousalis, Cambridge Scholars Press, 2009). His current research interests include: Populism, illiberalism and Euroscepticism; Greek Diaspora; South East Europe and geopolitical challenges; Greek and Turkish foreign policies; Russia and the Balkans; Western Balkan party politics.

**DR FOTEINI KALANTZI** is the A.G. Leventis Research Officer at the Diaspora Project in SEESOX, St Antony's College, University of Oxford. Her work focuses on the Greek state – diaspora relationship in the context of the economic crisis. At the moment she is carrying out research on the positions of political elites towards the Greek diaspora. She is one of the convenors of the 'International Politics of Migration, Refugees and Diaspora' working group of British International Studies Association. She received her PhD in International Relations from University of Macedonia, Greece and carried out part of her research in Freie Universitaet Berlin. She holds an MA in International Political Economy from University of Warwick, UK, a BA in International and European Relations from Panteion University, Athens and a BSc in Economics from University of La Verne, California. She has teaching experience in International and European Relations, Economics and Ethics in social media at the Department of International Relations of Université de Strasbourg at City Unity College in Athens. Her research interests include migration, political and media discourse analysis, Greek political affairs and European integration. She has been a research associate at the Hellenic Centre for European Studies (EKEM), specialising among others on the economic aspects of Euro-Med affairs. She has also worked as a researcher at Hellenic Foundation for European and Foreign Policy (ELIAMEP) on the EU funded project "Multicultural Europe". She has also worked as a freelance journalist at several newspapers and magazines, reporting on financial and political developments in Europe.

**SIR DAVID MADDEN** joined the UK Diplomatic Service in 1970, and has extensive experience of working in places on the brink of break-up (Yugoslavia in the 1980s), those divided (Berlin in the 1970s, Cyprus, Bosnia and Herzegovina), and those where there are regional tensions. As British High Commissioner in Cyprus (1994-1999), he played a full role in negotiations on a Cyprus settlement and EU accession. As British Ambassador in Greece (1999-2004), he helped the Greek government achieve a breakthrough against terrorism. He has a degree in the History of Art from the Courtauld Institute and is a published author (*The Mystery Of Edwin Drood*, Unthank Books, 2011; and *Balkan Legacies Of The Great War: The Past Is Never Dead* (with Othon Anastasakis and Elizabeth Roberts, Palgrave Macmillan, 2016). He is Trustee of Compassion in World Farming.

**DR MANOLIS PRATSINAKIS** is the Onassis Foundation Research Fellow at the Department of Politics and International Relations, University of Oxford and the Deputy Manager of the Greek Diaspora Project at South East European Studies at Oxford (SEESOX). He was previously a Marie Curie postdoctoral fellow at the University of Macedonia (2015-2017), a visiting fellow at the University of Sussex (2016) and a lecturer at the University of Amsterdam (2013-2015). His academic interests broadly concern the study of migration and nationalism. He has done research and published on immigrant-native relations, ethnic boundaries and categorization, everyday nationhood, brain drain, and intra-EU mobility in the post 2008 period. Manolis has studied Geography and Sociology (with honors) and completed his PhD in 2013 in Anthropology. His MA studies were supported by a Huygens scholarship from Nuffic and his PhD research by a postgraduate IKY scholarship.
